
I've been actively collecting all things Doctor Strange since 2002, and have amassed one of the world's largest collections of his comics, prints, posters, cards and collectibles.

# PART ONE: THE U.K.

UK CAC 96 CONVENTION PROGRAM Bryan Talbot did the fantastic cover for this 1996 UK Comic Convention.



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
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MARVEL SUPERHEROES AND THE OCCULT WINTER SPECIAL This cover has never been reprinted in America.

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
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• PREVIOUS PAGE: An original 6 page text story from The Marvel Story Book Annual (1967). This hardcover edition was only published in the UK.

PART TWO: MEXICO

Doctor Centella, as Dr. Strange is known in Mexico, first appeared in Los Fantasticos #35, which reprinted the early Strange Tales appearances by Steve Ditko and Stan Lee. He later moved on to costar with Nick Fury and S.H.I.E.L.D. in Agente Internacional. Finally the good



doctor was given his own series. Here's a sample of some Mexican cover variants, along with the cover to #8 of "Selecciones Marvel Presental Los Defensores", which has an original painted cover only printed in Mexico.










I created a series of Strange Tales cover variants with Ditko's Dr. Strange featued on the cover instead of The Human Torch. Here's my take on the Mexican version...

Here's a selection of some German comics that feature DER MAGIER: DOKTOR STRANGE!



In Australia, Doctor Strange was published by both Newton Comics and Yaffa Comics, which reprinted the stories in magazine-sized black and white reprints similar to British weekly series like Rampage and Mighty World of Marvel.





I've only been able to track down Modern Age items from Russia and Japan that feature any Marvel characters. As far as I know, no Silver Age Marvel Comics have ever been printed there.

YOUNG DOCTOR STRANGE was an Italian-only release that introduced a teenage Master of The Mystic Arts. The book and story has yet to be printed in the US. It was published in Italy as a prestige hardcover graphic novel.

NEXT PAGE: The Marvel Tarocchi Tarot Deck (1995) featured Dr. Strange as The Magician and had his image on the back of each card. This Italian deck is long out of print and extremely rare.

TOP ROW (from left to right) are some digest-sized full-color reprints: Superaventuras Marvel #2, Almanaque Marvel #1, and Herois Da TV #60. BOTTOM ROW (from left to right) Herois Da TV #91, a regular comic-sized reprint of "What Is It That Disturbs You Stephen?" (O Que E Que Esta Te Perturbando, Stephen?), and a magazine sized reprint of Roger Stern and Mike Mignola's classic "Triumph and Torment" graphic novel starring Dr. Strange and Dr. Doom.



It comes with unassembled cube parts, sticker sheets and a small screwdriver to put it all together. Making it even more bizarre: the side of the box features DC Comics characters. Either the kit is a bootleg toy or an extremely "strange" licensed item that features both Marvel and DC production art.











These comics were published in Quebec by Les Editons Heritage and feature 2 issues of Doctor Strange in each. Interiors were black and white.

These comics, unlike their French Canadian counterparts, were printed in full color and bound like mini graphic novels instead of stapled. also tracked down a few more of Doc's appearances in French Marvel titles like Titans, Strange, and Dr. Strangefate. Also seen here is the French-only bound collection of Erik Larsen's 12 issue Defender's run and the Michael Golden graphic novel "Pour L'Amour De Clea". Bon Appetit!




























1972 and featured original painted covers. Even though these covers were similar to those published in the US, the added touch of the paint made them highly sought after to me. 
